The Corner Office

I want to congratulate the members who were nominated and elected to office this past month. The membership is lucky to have a group of committed people to help the local operate. The list of new officers is in the back of the newsletter.

At the June meeting of the mechanical licensing board the rules for initial licensure, renewal and the fees have finally been approved and will take effect on July 1, 2015. Renewal for a plumbing and or gas fitting license will now be on a 2 year cycle, the education requirements after July 1 will be 6 hours a cycle for plumbing and 6 hours for gas. The fees have also been reduced by 20 dollars. The mechanical inspectors have been actively stopping on construction sites and doing license checks individuals found working on plumbing or gas without a current license are being prosecuted and fined by the county attorney. Any member who has let their license go should look into getting it back as this is a huge part of the work we do.

The end of the legislative session brought one small success for labor and the Building Trades with the defeat of House Bill 450. The bill which passed the house drastically changed the definition of an employee making it easier for employers to classify people as independent contractors therefore avoiding the cost of workmen's compensation and employment security taxes. We were able to lobby the senate to change the bill to a study committee but in the end it was killed in the committee of conference.

We are still working with ORBIS on potential employment opportunities at the Portsmouth Naval Ship Yard. They are working to put together a bid on a 5 year contract to supply supplemental help to the yard during spikes in their work load. The contract should be awarded sometime this fall. Once the contract is awarded if ORBIS is successful in the bid we will be looking for members to complete background checks to be eligible for employment on the yard.

The annual union night will be held on Friday August 21st at the Fisher Cats. Any member who would like tickets will need to call the hall to let us know you would like to go and the number of tickets before July 31st so we can order the amount we need. The tickets entitle you to dinner and the game.

The NH AFL-CIO announced there scholarship awards recently, we had 2 members' children receive scholarships this year. Congratulations to Colin Williamson, the second place recipient and Molly Lachance the 4th place recipient.

Thank you to everyone who worked to make our outing a success and for everyone who came out to Bear Brook for the day, it is always good to see everybody enjoying the day.

Manpower Hour

Work in the Local has exploded over the last month with Seabrook Station and Schiller Station hiring members for longer term work. We currently have members on the road in MA, NY, NJ, GA, IO, FL and MN.

We currently have;

- * 102 working for Local Contractors
- * 65 working locally for Out of Town Contractors
- * 32 working on the road
- * 17 members out of work
- * 7 travel cards working locally

HVAC Unlimited has hired 1 plumber/fitter/welder for work on projects over the summer months.

NPI has hired 2 fitter/welders for jobbing throughout the state for the summer. They also project to hire plumbers on the school work they have in Pelham High School.

Federal Piping has work at Conway Hospital on stainless coming soon for a fitter/welder.

B&W in the Berlin Biomass has hired 16 members to do the final outage before turning the project over to the owner.

Day & Zimmermann at Seabrook Station has hired 16 members for Fukushima upgrades and outage prep. They will be hiring from August through mid-September for the October 1st 35 day outage. They currently project to need over 200 members for that outage so we will be recruiting manpower from sister locals and organizing. This work requires a 3 year background PHQ that is completed online once you have a hire date. You will have 2 hours added to your pay once you receive your badge at Seabrook Station. The Outage will work 6-12s with everyone getting a time and a half and double time day no matter what day you have off during the week.

Work on the road has slowed down this month as I have not been getting anyone out on the road but have been getting members back on a weekly basis. The work in Malta NY seems to be slowing down as well as the work in the city of Boston keeps getting delayed.

The Outing at Bear Brook State Park was a huge success due to all the members that showed up and all the hard work put in by Jimmy Griffin, Dave Pelletier, Mo Demers, Ken Lurvey, Mark Aslanian and John Cashin. We started a new tradition this year of taking a group picture and hope the group can continue to grow as the years go on.



Contract rate increases effective June 1, 2015


- Base wage increase \$ 0.25
